
NFORMATION FOR AUDIENCE

EVENT LOCATION

Performance occurs on the beach at Emu Point, on Roe Parade between the boat ramp and jetty.

PARKING

Parking is available at the following locations:

- Emu Point Playground
- Along Roe Parade
- · Boat Ramp (walk along footpath on Roe Parade to access seating area)

A designated drop off zone will be marked at the performance site to safely drop off your guests, seats and picnics prior to parking your car.

EVENT DURATION

Please arrive from 6.30pm to settle in and picnic prior to the performance commencing at 7.30pm. Event ends at 8.30pm.

SEATING

Please bring your own camp chairs or picnic rugs to use on the grassed tiers of Emu Point. Please note full size chairs will be confined to the top two tiers. ONLY Picnic rugs will be permitted on the lowest tier.

TOILETS

The closest toilets are located at the Boat Ramp, a 2 minute walk from the performance area and include an Accessible Toilet. Public toilets are also available at the rear of Emu Point Café.

ACCESS NEEDS

People using wheelchairs or experiencing limited mobility are able to access the performance on the top grassed tier (no stair descent required). Accessible parking will be available within the Drop Off Zone at the entry to the performance.

WHAT'S THE PERFORMANCE ABOUT?

Traps and Ladders is a contemporary circus performance that combines aerials and dance to create a moving painting that depicts key moments in the history of Miaritch Oyster Harbour.

The performance starts where the Menang legend of Watari ends.

Watari has died and her dingo digs a vast area to create her burial mound which we now call Green Island.

From here, rain comes, the sea floods into the area and Miaritch Oyster Harbour is created. Seagrass grows and fish and birds appear. Menang people build Fish Traps.

Later, land use around Oyster Harbour changes and this leads to increased sediment and nutrients flowing into the Harbour. The water quality rapidly declines and by the 1980s almost 90% of the seagrass has died. Fish populations shrink dramatically.

In response, people join forces to restore the water quality of Oyster Harbour. Soil testing commences, farmers reduce nutrient run off, water ways are fenced and seagrass is successful replanted. The action of many people results in a recovery of Miaritch.
